## ADMINISTRATIVE DECLARATION OF ONE HUNDRED AND EIGHTH EXTENSION OF THE LOCAL STATE OF EMERGENCY PURSUANT TO ORDINANCE NO. 2022-30

WHEREAS, on September 23, 2022, Florida Governor Ron DeSantis issued Executive Order Number 22-218, declaring a state of emergency in Brevard, Broward, Charlotte, Collier, DeSoto, Glades, Hardee, Hendry, Highlands, Hillsborough, Indian River, Lee, Manatee, Martin, Miami Dade, Monroe, Okeechobee, Osceola, Palm Beach, Pasco, Pinellas, Polk, Sarasota, and St. Lucie Counties; and

**WHEREAS**, on September 24, 2022, Governor DeSantis issued Executive Order Number 22-219, amending Executive Order Number 22-218 to declare a state of emergency in the entire State of Florida; and

WHEREAS, on November 21, 2022, Governor DeSantis issued Executive Order Number 22-268, renewing for sixty (60) days the state of emergency and all provisions of Executive Order Number 22-218, as amended by Executive Order Number 22-219; and

WHEREAS, on January 19, 2023, Governor DeSantis issued Executive Order 23-21, renewing for sixty (60) days the state of emergency and all provisions of Executive Order Number 22-218, and as amended by Executive Order 22-219 as extended by Executive Order 22-268, and;

WHEREAS, on March 17, 2023, Governor DeSantis issued Executive Order 23-60, renewing for sixty (60) days the state of emergency and all provisions of Executive Order 22-218, as amended by Executive Order 22-219 and as extended by Executive Order 22-268, and;

WHEREAS, on May 15, 2023, Governor DeSantis issued Executive Order 23-104, renewing for sixty (60) days the state of emergency and all provisions of Executive Order 22-218, as amended by Executive Order 22-219 and as extended by Executive Order 23-60, and;

WHEREAS, on July 13, 2023, Governor DeSantis issued Executive Order 23-139, renewing for sixty (60) days the state of emergency and all provisions of Executive Order 22-218, as amended by Executive Order 22-219 and as extended by Executive Order 23-104, and;

WHEREAS, on September 8, 2023, Governor DeSantis issued Executive Order 23-176, renewing for sixty (60) days the state of emergency and all provisions of Executive Order 22-218, as amended by Executive Order 22-219 and subsequently extended by Executive Order 23-139, and;

WHEREAS, on November 6, 2023, Governor DeSantis issued Executive Order 23-214, renewing for sixty (60) days the state of emergency and all provisions of Executive Order 22-218, as amended by Executive Order 22-219 and subsequently extended by Executive Order 23-176, and;

WHEREAS, on January 4, 2024, Governor DeSantis issued Executive Order 24-02, renewing for sixty (60) days the state of emergency and all provisions of Executive Order 22-218, as amended by Executive Order 22-219 and subsequently extended by Executive Order 23-214, and;

WHEREAS, on March 1, 2024, Governor DeSantis issued Executive Order 24-36, renewing for sixty (60) days the state of emergency and all provisions of Executive Order 22-218, as amended by Executive Order 22-219 and subsequently extended by Executive Order 24-02, and;

WHEREAS, on April 29, 2024, Governor DeSantis issued Executive Order 24-80, renewing for sixty (60) days the state of emergency and all provisions of Executive Order 22-218, as amended by Executive Order 22-219 and subsequently extended by Executive Order 24-36, and;

**WHEREAS**, on June 27, 2024, Governor DeSantis issued Executive Order 24-137, renewing for sixty (60) days the state of emergency and all provisions of Executive Order 22-218, as amended by Executive Order 22-219 and subsequently extended by Executive Order 24-80, and;

WHEREAS, on August 23, 2024, Governor DeSantis issued Executive Order 24-174, renewing for sixty (60) days the state of emergency and all provisions of Executive Order 22-218, as amended by Executive Order 22-219 and subsequently extended by Executive Order 24-137; and

WHEREAS, Florida Statutes Section 252.38(3)(a) gives authority to public subdivisions to declare and enact a state of local emergency for a period of up to seven (7) days and to take certain measures that are in the interest of the public health, safety, and welfare; and

WHEREAS, on September 25, 2022, the City Commission of the City of North Port, Florida adopted Ordinance No. 2022-30, declaring a state of local emergency due to Hurricane Ian; authorizing the City Manager or designee the power and authority set forth in Florida Statutes Section 252.38(3)(a), and the authority to take any and all action deemed necessary during this state of emergency; waiving the standard procedures and formalities required by law pertaining to those matters identified in Florida Statutes Section 252.38(3)(a)5, including but not limited to the City Manager's procurement of goods and services requiring emergency action; and authorizing the City Manager or the City Manager's designee to extend this state of local emergency in seven-day increments; and

WHEREAS, on September 29, 2022, President Joe Biden declared that a major disaster exists in the State of Florida and ordered Federal aid to supplement recovery efforts in the areas affected by Hurricane Ian beginning on September 23, 2022, which makes federal funding available to local governments in Sarasota County; and

WHEREAS, the impact of Hurricane Ian poses an immediate and present danger to the public health, safety, or welfare to the City of North Port, Florida, and its residents, thereby warranting the extension of this local state of emergency.

THEREFORE, IN HIS EMERGENCY AUTHORITY, THE CITY MANAGER OF THE CITY OF NORTH PORT, FLORIDA DECLARES:

- 1. The local state of emergency related to Hurricane Ian is extended as permitted by law and authorized by Ordinance No. 2022-30.
- 2. By this declaration, the City of North Port invokes the emergency management powers granted to it pursuant to Section 252.38, Florida Statutes, its adopted emergency management plan, and all related Executive Orders of the Governor of the State of Florida.
- 3. By this declaration, the City Manager invokes all powers and authority granted to him or his designee in Ordinance No. 2022-30.

This declaration is effective at 2:10 P.M. on October 19, 2024, and remains in effect until it expires by operation of law or until the emergency conditions no longer exist as determined by the City Manager.
